Conflict of interest

No public official or employee shall use or authorize the use of the authority or influence of office or employment to secure anything of value or the promise or offer of anything of value that is of such a character as to manifest a substantial and improper influence upon the public official or employee with respect to that person's duties.

Scenario

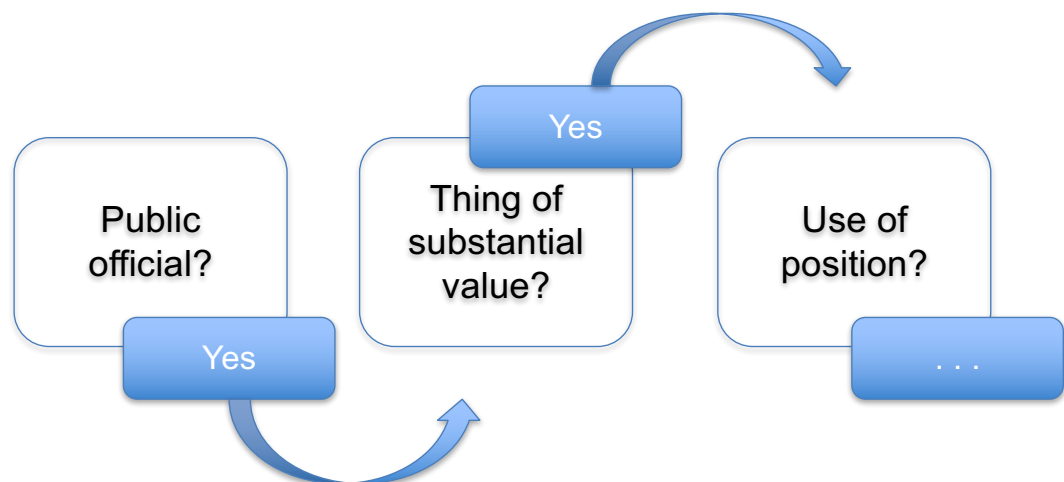

Scenario

Henry is a school board member in the Hollywood School District. His daughter, Jane, is a junior at Hollywood high school, and competes as a member of the school's softball team.

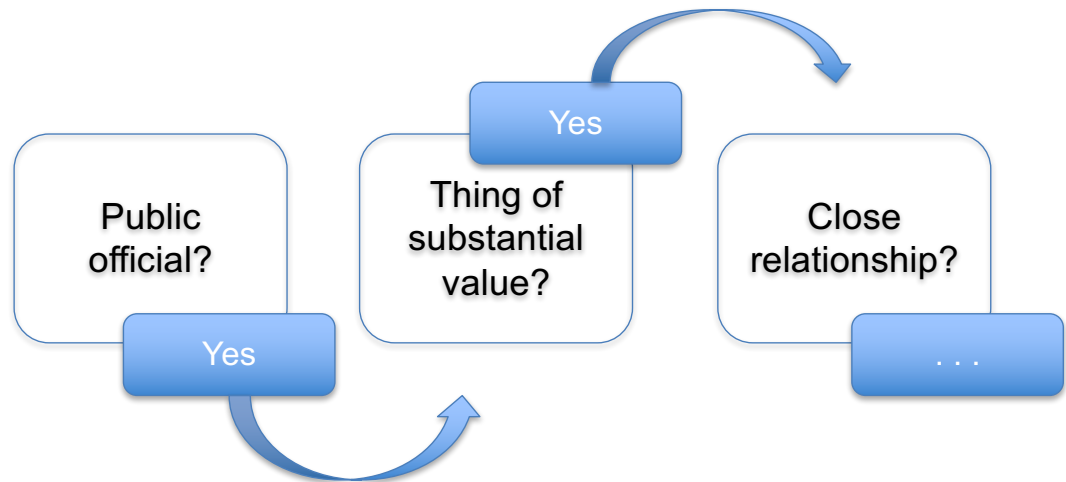
On Monday, Jane and other players were involved in a fight after a game. The coach has barred Jane from competing for the rest of season.

- Can Henry go directly to the coach to discuss this?
- Can Henry ask the board to direct to the Superintendent to overturn the coach's punishment?

Lenny is the Feeney School District's representative on the Career Center board. Lenny owns the L & S motorcycle repair shop with his buddy, Squiggy.

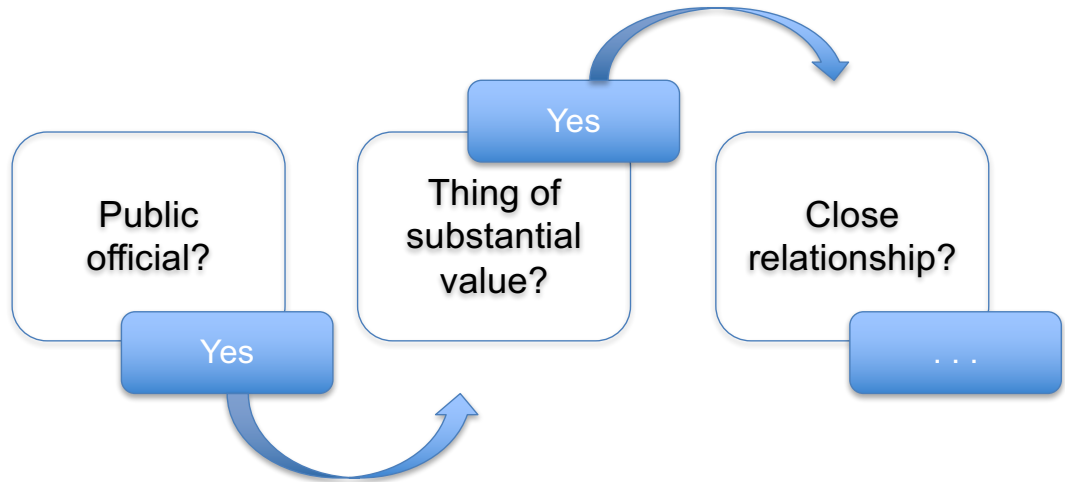
Squiggy is building a new house, and has approached Lenny about having the HVAC program at the Career Center do some work on his house.

Accepting things of value

RC 102.03(E):

No public official or employee shall solicit or accept anything of value or the promise or offer of anything of value that is of such a character as to manifest a substantial and improper influence upon the public official or employee with respect to that person's duties.

Improper influence

Improper is determined by the source of the thing. An improper source is any person, company, private/public entity

- Regulated by,
- Doing business with,
- Seeking to do business with, or
- Interested in matters before the entity

Substantial influence

Substantial is determined by the value of the thing.

Substantial things of value

- **substantial gifts**
- **meals at expensive restaurants**
- **discounts on consumer goods**
- **golf outings**
- **jewelry**
- **travel, meals, lodging**

Not substantial things of value

- **nominal gift**
- **promotional item**
- **meal at family restaurant**
- **inexpensive entertainment activities**

Scenario

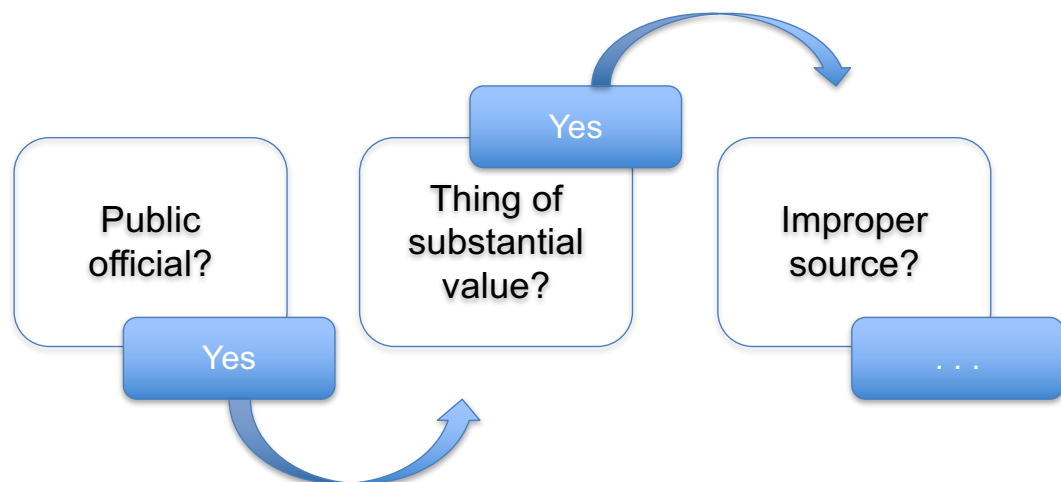

Scenario

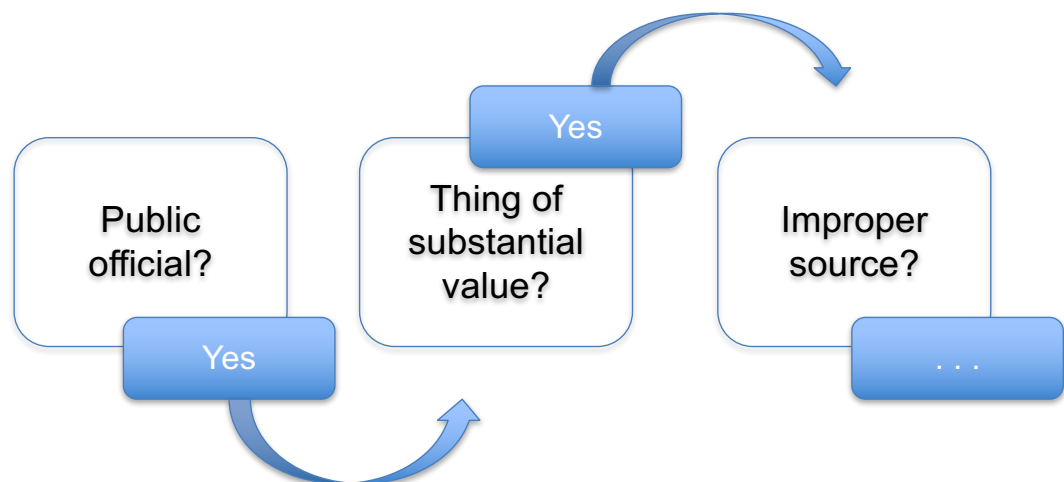

RC 2921.42(A)(1)

(A) No public official shall knowingly :

(1) Authorize, or employ the authority or influence of the public official's office to secure authorization of any public contract in which the public official, a member of the public official's family, or any of the public official's business associates has an interest.

RC 2921.42(A)(4)

- (A) No public official shall knowingly :
- (4) Have an interest in the profits or benefits of a public contract entered into by or for the use of the political subdivision or governmental agency or instrumentality with which the public official is connected.

Scenario

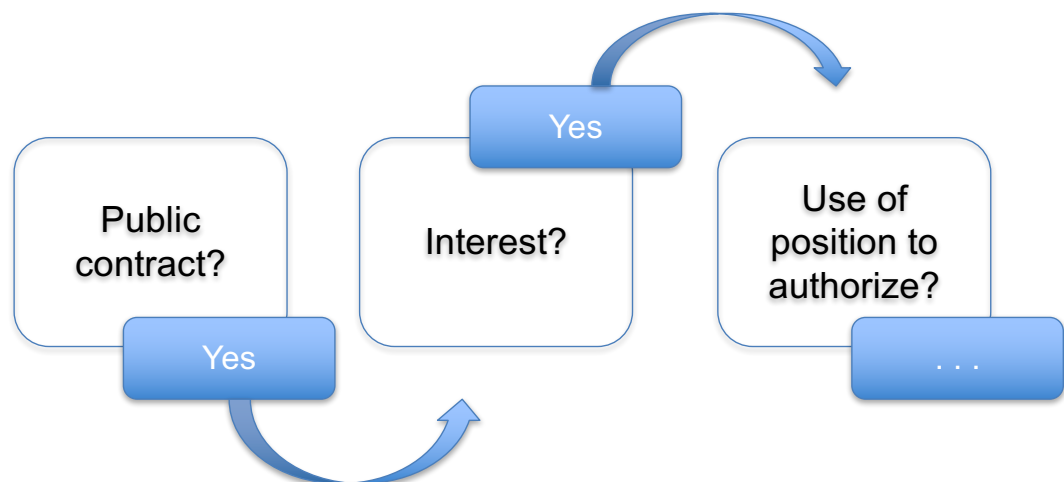
Luna is a school board member for Hogsmeade EVSD. She is also a trustee of a local nonprofit, Wizards for Sight, which provides vision screening services.

Scenario

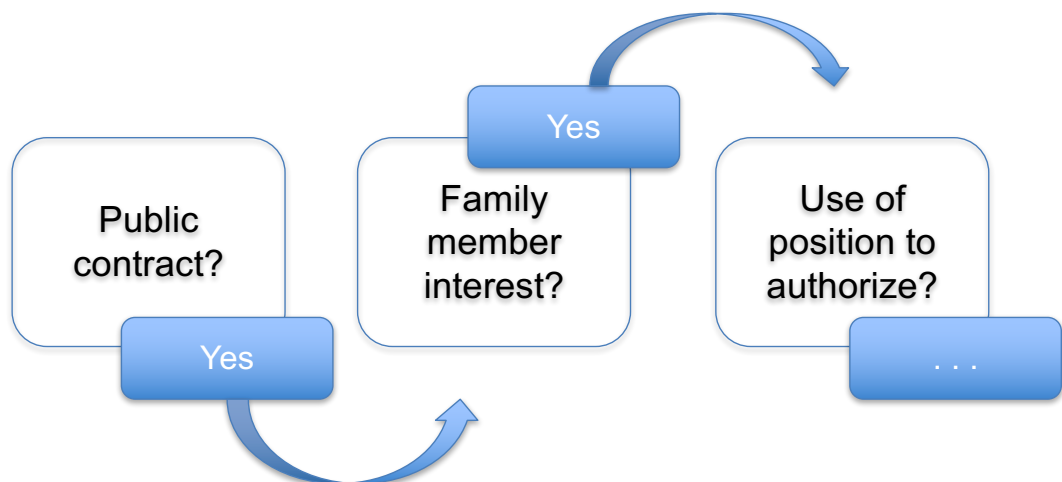
Carol is a school board member in the Sherwood City School District. Her daughter, Jan, is a certified lifeguard and wants to work at the district's pool this summer.
